Legends: Joe Norris 1908-2001

Joe Norris launched his career as the “Boy Wonder” of Detroit. In 1933, he organized the first Stroh’s Bohemian Beer team, starting the golden era of beer team sponsorships. In ABC Championships Tournament competition, Norris won three titles and knocked down a record 123,770 pins in a record-tying 71 appearances. He was selected as one of Bowling Magazine’s “20 Best Bowlers of the 20th Century.”

At age 86, he bowled his second career 300 game, at the time becoming the oldest person to do so.

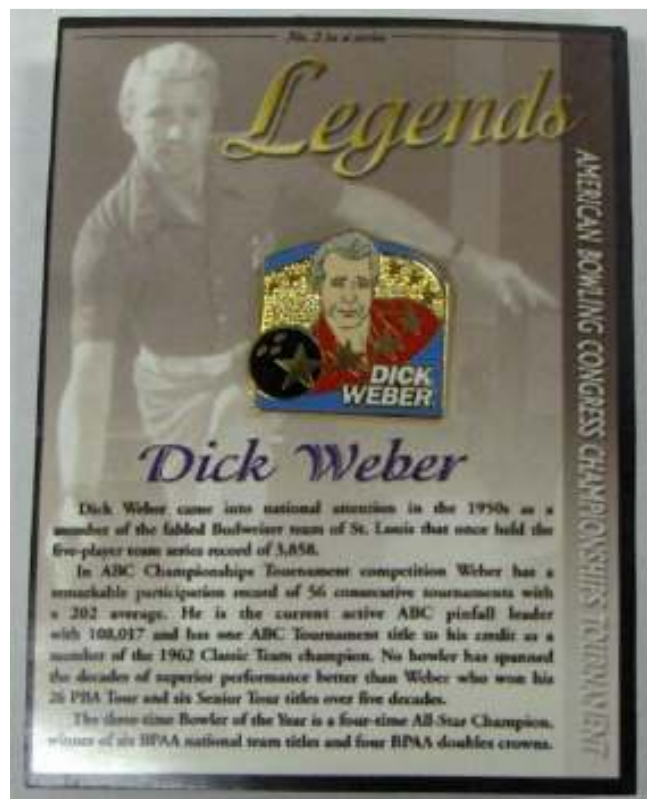


Legends: Dick Weber 1929-2005

Dick Weber came into national attention in the 1950s as a member of the fabled Budweiser team of St. Louis that once held the five-player team series record of 3,858.

In ABC Championships Tournament competition Weber has a remarkable participation record of 56 consecutive tournaments with a 202 average. He is the current active ABC pinfall leader with 108,017 and has one ABC Tournament title to his credit as a member of the 1962 Classic Team champion. No bowler has spanned the decades of superior performance better than Weber who won his 26 PBA Tour and six Senior Tour titles over five decades.

The three-time Bowler of the Year is a four-time All-Star Champion, winner of six BPAA national team titles and four BPAA doubles crowns.



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Legends: Bill Lillard 1927-

After winning his first two ABC Tournament titles in 1955 (team and team all-events) with the Detroit Pfeiffers, Lillard made bowling history on March 24-25, 1956 when he became the first bowler to win four titles in one ABC Tournament. He won team and team all-events crowns with the Falstaffs that year while also winning all-events and partnering with Stan Gifford for the doubles crown.

He won Classic Team titles in 1962 and 1971 bringing his ABC Tournament career title total to eight, tying him with fellow Hall of Famer Fred Bujack for second on the all-time list. He is one of seven bowlers to knock down 100,000 pins in ABC Tournament competition. He also won the 1955 and 1956 National Match Game Championship and was voted Bowler of the Year in 1956. He won his lone PBA Tour title in 1966.

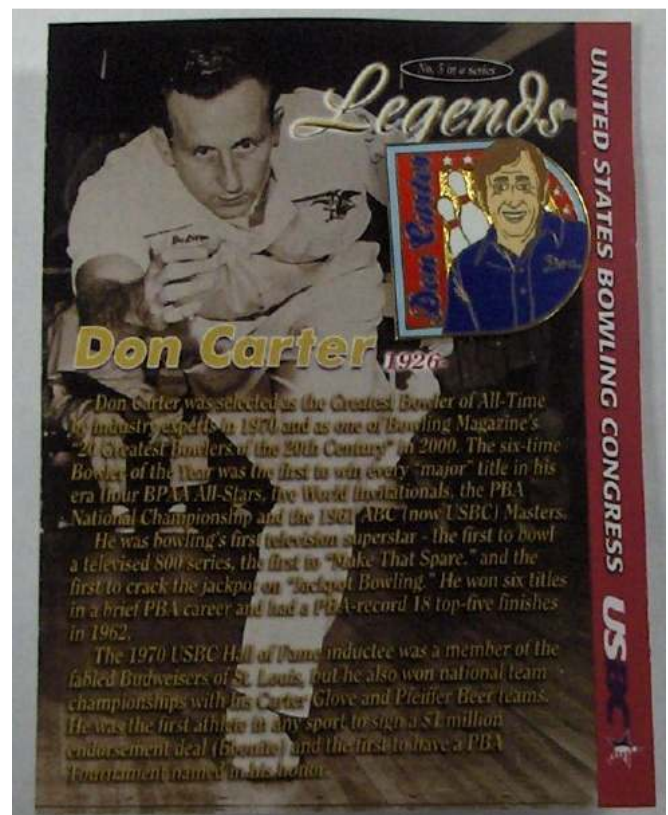
A member of the ABC Hall of Fame, Lillard was voted as one of Bowling Magazine's top "20 Bowlers of the 20th Century."



Legends: Don Carter 1926-2012

Don Carter was selected as the Greatest Bowler of All-Time by industry experts in 1970 and as one of Bowling Magazine's "20 Greatest Bowlers of the 20th Century" in 2000. The six-time Bowler of the Year was the first to win every "major" title in his era: four BPAA All-Stars, five World Invitationals, the PBA National Championship and the 1961 ABC (now USBC) Masters. He was bowling's first television superstar – the first to bowl a televised 800 series, the first to "Make That Spare," and the first to crack the jackpot on "Jackpot Bowling." He won six titles in a brief PBA career and had a PBA-record 18 top-five finishes in 1962.

The 1970 USBC Hall of Fame inductee was a member of the fabled Budweisers of St. Louis but he also won national team championships with this Carter Glove and Pfeiffer Beer teams. He was the first athlete in any sport to sign a \$1 million endorsement deal (Ebonite) and the first to have a PBA Tournament named in his honor.



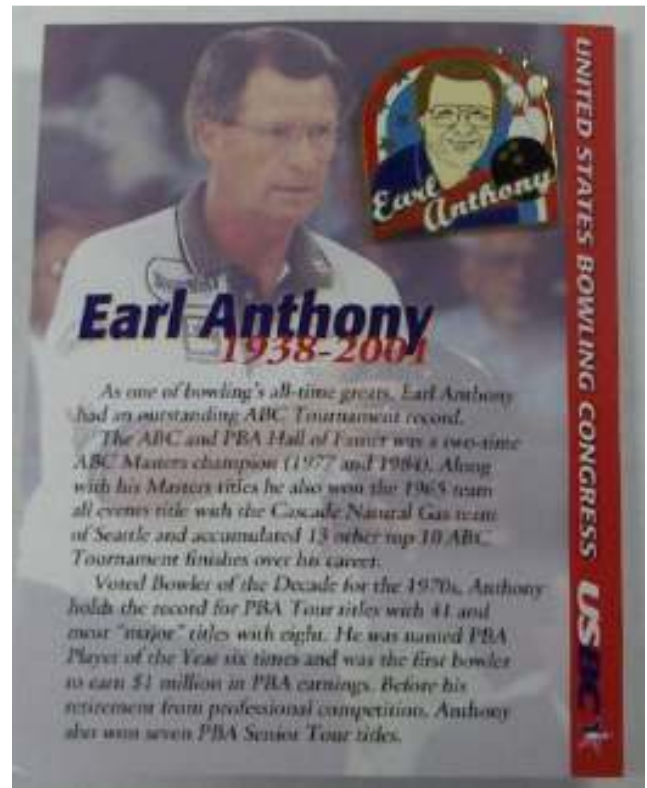
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Legends: Earl Anthony 1938-2001

As one of bowling's all-time greats, Earl Anthony had an outstanding ABC Tournament record. The ABC and PBA Hall of Famer was a two-time ABC Masters champion (1977 and 1984). Along with his Masters titles he also won the 1965 team all-events title with the Cascade Natural Gas team of Seattle and accumulated 13 other top 10 ABC Tournament finishes over his career.

Voted Bowler of the Decade for the 1970s, Anthony holds the record for PBA Tour titles with 41 and most "major" titles with eight. He was named PBA Player of the Year six times and was the first bowler to earn \$1 million in PBA earnings. Before his retirement from professional competition, Anthony also won seven PBA Senior Tour titles.



Legends: Mike Aulby 1960-

Mike Aulby, an Indianapolis native, is the only bowler to win three USBC Masters titles (1989, 1995, 1998). He retired as a full-time PBA Touring Player with 27 PBA titles including two PBA National Championships, one U.S. Open, one Tournament of Champions and one Touring Players Championship – the "Super Slam" of major championships. He also won the Showboat Invitational and Brunswick Memorial World Open, two additional 56-game formal events. With more than \$2 million in PBA career earnings, Aulby was a four-time Bowler of the Year and a two-time Steve Nagy Sportsmanship award winner. Aulby was the first to win both PBA Rookie of the Year (1979) and PBA Player of the Year (1985 and 1995) honors.
